3 Sarah Polasses (the handsome woman) wife of Dr. Alstead

Sarah Polasses told me the last time I saw her that Paul Mully's father was Gov. John Neptune

Paul Mully, also called, Paul Nicola. There is also a Newell Paul Mully mentioned in grandfather's books, who is among the men.

Mully had a sister Madeline the mother of old

Dr. Scattis Mitchell's wife; Madeline was

pleasant; Mully cross at times.

I do not know whether old Capt. Paul Mully, the great checker player, who died blind at 90, was the same but think it impossible. (Note, they were different, for I find that Paul Mully died in 1887. I saw his widow, his second wife, who said she was a sister to Joe Francis a small dark woman, with pleasant manners and beautiful black hair. She said she was 49 years old.
