

certain extent that of insanity, I have felt that the Dr. was a man well informed and well versed in his profession, and in that department which more especially comes under his care.

Q. What do you find as to the progressiveness and modernness of his information on those subjects? A. I find him using the more modern class of remedies, and such as are usually used by the profession at the present day.

I should say he was looking after the general health of the patients as well as after the mental disease of insanity, and that he treats local difficulties that patients may have when they occur, applying proper medical remedies. We find that to be the case very frequently.

Q. For instance, take a patient who came in there insane and had also a diseased liver? A. I think the Dr. would look after a difficulty of that kind intelligently and faithfully.

Q. And that trouble would be treated locally in addition to the treatment for insanity? A. Yes, sir, considering that, of course,
