

Indians commonly send a question expecting an affirmative answer with "aunt he." "You go d that paddle aunt he?" "He won't broke d, dont you think?" "You join that place aunt he?"

They often use a pretense or a past participle and auxiliary instead of present. "He dont swim" is equal to "I do not swim"
