

The clothing is purchased at wholesale and dealt out at as near cost as can be arrived at and charged out to the patients. There is a department that is under the control of one of the clerks. The clerk charges himself with all the goods received and credits himself with all issued to patients and they become debts in the patients bill.

Q. Is there a sufficient amount of clothing furnished for the patients and reasonably of strong quality? A. I have never heard the superintendent complain of it. I have always understood that he felt satisfied with it. If he wanted twice as much or twice as good clothing he would, I suppose, pay so, and it would be obtained.

Q. What is your observation as to the neatness with which the clothing and the patients are kept in that regard?
