Order from The House of Representatives, appointing Messrs. Johnson of Cornish, Shovey of Litchfield, Cushman of Bowdoin, Keene of Bremen, Dixon of Clinton, Sylvester of Phillips and Knowlton of Northport, a Committee, with such as the Senate may join, to report to this Legislature some suitable mode of investing the money arising from the sale of all or any part of the twenty townships of the public land, authorized to be sold by an act of Feb. 23, 1828, to constitute a permanent fund in aid of primary schools — the same to be put on interest in such manner as a future Legislature shall determine — read and passed, and Messrs. Soule, Ham and Severance were joined.

The Committee on Roads and Bridges reported leave to withdraw on petition of the Selectmen of Livermore and Stanley Carter — read and accepted, in concurrence.

Mr. Littlefield, from the the Committee on the Judiciary, to which was referred the "Bill authorizing the taxation of certain lands when the fee is in the State or Commonwealth," reported that said Bill ought not to pass — read and accepted. Sent down for concurrence. Concurred.

The Committee on the Judiciary reported legislation inexpedient on petition of Joseph Hall and others, and "Bill additional respecting pounds, and impounding beasts, going at large, or damage feasant and stray Beasts," also "Bill altering an Act con-
