Dr. Butler: We do not claim
that her insanity was in any
way made worse or increased by
the mode of treatment.

Q. Will you read from the case
book what there is in the case,
giving first the date of admission.

A. Admitted April 2, 1877. Age, 29.
Married, house wife. She has 3 children,
oldest 6, youngest $2\frac{1}{2}$ of age. She was
taken very suddenly with convulsions in
the night losing all consciousness,
frothing at the mouth some purple
in the face, clenching of hands &c.
This is my description of her case as
given by her friends. "One month
before birth of youngest child the
second child fell into the water and
she jumped in and rescued him, but
only seemed a little more nervous after it.
She had nursed the child a long
time. She had been to church the
day before in a warm day.
